### **Spring Valley Lake Spillway Improvements to Begin in July**

The long-awaited Spring Valley Lake Spillway improvements are set to begin next month. This project has been in the works for more than 10 years and is necessary to replace the existing corroded spillway pipes and bring the dam up to current safety standards. Every effort has been made by the Village to minimize the impact of the project on all residents; however, based on the scope of the project and the amount of time to refill the lake, the entire process will take approximately 12 months.

During the construction component of the project, Memorial Causeway will be closed for approximately 5-7 months. Therefore, to directly access Rays Bridge Road from the Village, drivers will have to utilize Lakeview Drive or Pine Ridge Drive. The Village will deploy detour signage and make the appropriate notifications to Moore County Schools and local first responders.

The closure of Memorial Causeway is planned for July 22, which is when the general contractor will begin mobilizing on site with equipment and materials. The start date is subject to change; but, will not be sooner than July 22. Once mobilized, it will take the general contractor approximately 30 days (week of August 19) before beginning the lake drawdown process, which will require the water level to be lowered at least 13 feet. The permit from the state requires that the water level be decreased no more than 1 foot per day. Therefore, the drawdown process will take approximately 2-3 weeks.

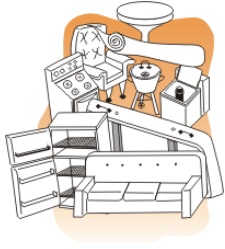
Between mobilization beginning and the lake level returning to normal, Spring Valley lakefront residents will be allowed to store trailered boats in their driveways. The Village is working with Seven Lakes Marine to facilitate boat relocation services immediately prior to the lake drawdown. The boat relocation services have been tentatively planned for a weekday(s) during the week of August 12. If you haven't already contacted Village Hall and you are interested in this service, please contact Village Hall at 910-949-3141 as soon as possible; but no later than Friday, August 2. The Village will forward the contact information to Seven Lakes Marina who will contact each interested resident to coordinate the relocation of their boat. This service, the cost of which will be the responsibility of the resident, will be between Seven Lakes Marina and the resident. With the anticipation of multiple residents taking advantage of this service, Seven Lakes Marina is prepared to perform this service at a discounted rate. The actual rate will be contingent upon how many residents participate.

Once the construction component of the project is completed, the lake will begin to refill which will take several months and will be strictly dependent on mother nature, i.e. rainfall.

The Village Council and staff have collaborated with the Village Engineer to minimize any inconvenience for our residents. Rest assured that every reasonable consideration has been given to completing this project while keeping the long-term best interest of our Village at the forefront.

## **FREE - Bulky Item Pickup**



For the convenience of Whispering Pines residents, the Village offers a Bulky Item Pick Up once a year during the month of August. Bulky item collection means that certain items such as mattresses, appliances, furniture and electronics that cannot fit into your garbage can or that need special handling will be picked up by appointment on Mondays during the month of August. To schedule a bulky item pickup, please contact Village Hall at (910) 949-3141 x11 on Fridays before 4:00 PM the week before you want your pick-up on Mondays. There is a maximum capacity and preference will be given to early callers.

**Acceptable Items for Bulk Collection:** Household & lawn furniture, carpet, area rugs, bicycles, toilets, grills (no propane) mattresses and box springs, televisions, computers, White Goods - Stoves, refrigerators, freezers (doors must be removed), water heaters, dishwashers, microwaves.

**Items NOT Accepted:** Construction, demolition or remodeling materials, mirrors or glass of any kind, bagged trash, cardboard, yard debris, chemicals, paint, car parts, batteries, motor oil, or tires.

**OPERATION OF GOLF CARTS ON PUBLIC STREETS AND ROADS**

**It is dangerous for children to drive golf carts.**

Whispering Pines Code of Ordinance, Chapter D, Article VI. Section 2: Operation on Public Streets and Roads states:

It is unlawful to operate a golf cart within the Village on any public street or road where the speed limit exceeds 35 miles per hour. On any public street or road within the Village where the speed limit is 35 miles per hour or less, golf carts may be operated, but only in accordance with the following provisions.

**a. No person may operate a golf cart UNLESS THAT PERSON IS LICENSED TO DRIVE UPON THE STREETS and highways of North Carolina and then, only in accordance with such driver's license. An operator of golf cart MUST BE AT LEAST SIXTEEN YEARS OF AGE.**

**e. Golf carts must be operated to the extreme right of the roadway and MUST YIELD TO ALL VEHICULAR AND PEDESTRIAN TRAFFIC.**

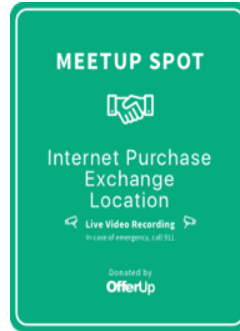


Since school is out for the summer, please watch out for children playing throughout the Village. Parents should watch their children when playing outdoors and not let children play in the streets.

**When school starts again:** Children waiting for school buses should wait in a safe place well away from the road. They should not run and play or leave book bags in the roadway. If children must cross the road to get on the bus they should wait until the bus has come to a full stop and check for traffic both ways before entering the roadway. Also, when exiting a school bus, children should check traffic both ways before crossing the road.

The Senior Citizen Call Program is a great program for those that live alone. In this free program participants call in to the Police Department every day by 9:00 am. If a call has not been received by 9:00 am, the Police Department will call the participant. If unable to contact the participant, an officer will go to their residence to check on their well-being.

## USE OF PARKS AND LAKES

1. The lakes are made available for recreational uses by temporary or permanent residents.
2. Guests of residents/property owners may use the lake recreational facilities only when accompanied by the host, or when a permit has been issued by the Village Administrative Staff or the Whispering Pines Police Department. Guests not accompanied by their host must have a guest pass in their possession at all times while on the lake premises.
3. All parks and lake access areas shall be closed to all persons and to the parking of vehicles or trailers of any type from 9:00 pm to 6:00 am.
4. Noise regulations as specified in Chapter F, Article II of the Code of Ordinances shall be complied with on the Lakes and in the access areas.
5. All boats shall be equipped with at least one U.S. Coast Guard approved Personal Flotation Device (PFD) for each person in the boat. Water skiers shall wear a PFD at all times. Each boat towing a skier shall contain at least two (2) responsible persons; one a driver and another observing the person or persons skiing.
6. Children under the age of 12 are prohibited from swimming, boating, or playing in the lakes unless accompanied by an adult responsible for the safety of the child.
7. Internal combustion engine powered watercraft shall move in a counter-clockwise direction on Thagard Lake.
8. All N.C. boating laws and safety rules and regulations apply.
9. Speed limit for boats is 32 mph.
10. The use of ballast tanks on wake boats is prohibited.



### ATTENTION KAYAKERS, PADDLE BOARDERS, CANOEISTS AND INDIVIDUAL SWIMMERS ON THAGARD LAKE

The motor boats using the lake are unable to see you. The color, size and profile of your water craft makes it extremely difficult for boaters to see you; taking into considering the boat operator is dealing with sun glare and reflection from the water and watching for other boats in the vicinity. The boats must stay inside the red buoys and/or 150 feet from the shoreline. If the kayakers, paddle boards, and canoes use the area from the shoreline to the buoys or 100 yards behind the island toward the bridge this would create a safe environment for everyone to enjoy the lake.

## VILLAGE PARKS

The Village has many parks for residents to enjoy. We recognize that some of the parks get very crowded and parking is limited. If a park is crowded please visit one of the other parks that are less crowded.

Remember that parking in the roadway is never allowed. Also, the Village has an ordinance that prohibits dogs being off of a leash so for those that take their dogs to the parks remember they must be on a leash at all times.

If you have guests that would like to use the lakes and parks (not being accompanied by the resident) you can obtain a guest pass from the Police Department or Village Hall free of charge.

### **SWIM SAFELY**

With our many lakes and private pools readily available for swimming keeping safety first will help prevent such a fun activity from becoming a tragedy.

- Always watch your children and never leave them unattended. Constant supervision is the most effective method to prevent drowning.
- Do not rely on floatation devices to protect your children from drowning. You must supervise them at all times.
- Have a phone nearby.
- Have children swim in pairs- the "buddy system".
- If a child is missing - check the pool first.
- Teach your child how to swim.

- Use self-closing latches and gates.
- Install a door alarm from the house to the pool area.
- Have lifesaving equipment nearby such as life rings or reaching poles.

### **STAY HEALTHY**

Throughout the course of the summer there will be periods of unhealthy high temperatures and humidity. Drink plenty of water throughout the course of each day, wear light colored clothing and take frequent breaks in an air conditioned environment. If someone is sweating profusely with a pale skin color and is ill with any or all of the following symptoms; cramps, light headiness, dizziness, shortness of breath and nausea; move them to a shady or air conditioned area, provide them with water and cool wet compresses to help reduce their body temperature. These symptoms could indicate that the person might be suffering from heat exhaustion. If their condition does not improve within a matter of minutes; call 911.

### **GRILL SAFETY**

- NEVER use a grill indoors including garages, overhangs, and canopies.
- Maintain a 10-foot perimeter from anything combustible – including your house!!!
- Keep children and pets away from the grill area.
- Only use approved ignition fluids – NEVER use gasoline to ignite a grill
- Keep a fire extinguisher, garden hose or bucket of sand nearby to douse a grill fire.
- Inspect your grill before you ignite to ensure everything is in working order. Inspect all connections on your gas grill to make sure they are tight and not leaking.

### **RECRUITMENT**

Our Fire Rescue Department is a "combination" department, in that we rely upon full-time, part-time, and pay-per-call (volunteers) personnel to provide fire, rescue, and emergency medical services. We are always looking for additional personnel to assist us with providing quality emergency services to our community. The ideal candidate will be physically able to perform firefighting duties and/or provide emergency medical care and live within our Fire District. More importantly, the candidate must have time to attend two (2) drills (Tuesday evenings) a month, stand-by the station for 12 hours per month, and attend formal training classes which are provided free of charge by the Sandhills Community College. The formal training classes are typically held evenings during the week and occasionally the weekends. In addition to the rewards of serving your community, other benefits include uniforms, paid contributions to a retirement system, free training and certification.

We also offer a Junior Fire Rescue Program, which is open to individuals that live within the Fire District that are 14-17 years of age. Junior personnel must have the written permission from their parents, be physically able to perform the duties of a firefighter or emergency medical technician and maintain a C average in school if they have not graduated. This program is designed to allow Junior personnel to gain insight and interest in becoming a long-term contributing member of our Department, and potentially lead to a career in the emergency services field.

### THE DO'S AND DON'TS OF DRIVEWAYS

Village Hall receives many calls from residents complaining that their driveway culvert, ditch or pipe are clogged and not allowing stormwater to flow through. Many times, the request made by the resident, is for the Village to send someone out to fix it. People are often shocked when they are reminded that it is their responsibility, as the property owner, to maintain the culverts / pipes to allow stormwater to flow freely.

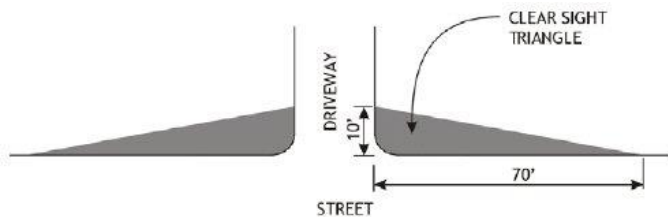
The Whispering Pines Land Development Ordinance (LDO) states:

Section 9.2.1 C – The maintenance of driveways located in or on the right-of-way shall be the responsibility of the property owner.

Section 9.2.2 C – Driveways and culverts must be maintained in order to allow safe ingress and egress. When a culvert is required, the culvert must be maintained so as to allow the unimpeded flow of water within the roadside ditch.

Another common complaint pertains to visibility issues due to large plantings or decorative items placed near the mailbox. The LDO addresses this issue also.

Section 9.2.3 F - For any driveway, a sight triangle measuring ten feet from the pavement and extending 70 feet from the edge of each side of the driveway shall be required; excluding mailbox placement.



- a. Within the sight triangle, no materials which would impede traffic visibility shall be allowed. Structures, fences and plant materials that extend into the sight triangle between two- and one-half feet and eight feet in height, as measured from the grade of the street or drive, shall not be allowed.

Although we appreciate the aesthetic aspects provided by such items, our main focus is traffic visibility especially this time of year when there is an abundance of people / children walking and riding bikes on our residential streets.

## CASES OF MISTAKEN IDENTITY

A comparison of commonly confused Northeastern venomous and non-venomous snakes

### VENOMOUS

### NON-VENOMOUS



#### Timber Rattlesnake

*Crotalus horridus*

- Recognized by a tall rattle, a shovel head, facial pits (see picture), and vertical pupils.
- Adult length: 36-54 inches
- Typically a yellowish color with brown or black bands down its back.
- Found in deciduous forests on rugged terrain.
- Hibernates in rocky crevices and dens.
- Endangered in several Northeastern states: NJ, VT, MA, and NH.

#### Eastern Hognose

*Heterodon platirhinos*

- Distinguished by an upturned snout (see picture), lack of facial pits, and round pupils.
- Adult length: 18-45 inches
- Variable coloration; can be spotted yellow or all black.
- Found in woodlands with dry sandy areas.
- When threatened the hognose will flatten its neck and bring its head up off the ground.
- It may also play dead.



#### Copperhead

*Agkistrodon contortrix*

- Recognized by a copper/brown/red shovel head, facial pits (see picture), and vertical pupils.
- Adult length: 24-36 inches
- Juveniles have tails with yellow tips.
- Found in forests, rocky outcrops, and farmland fields.
- Endangered in MA.

#### Eastern Milk Snake

*Lampropeltis triangulum*

- Distinguished by a Y or V on the top of its head, tapered tail, a lack of facial pits, and rounded pupils.
- Adult length: 24-36 inches
- Typically has bands of red/brown/black down its body. Its underbelly is checkered white and black.
- Found in fields, forests, or rocky outcrops.
- Has a broad range across the Northeast.



#### Cottonmouth

*Agkistrodon piscivorus*

- Recognized by black "hourglass" bands on its back, a flattened head, facial pits (see picture), and vertical pupils.
- Adult length: 30-48 inches
- When threatened the cottonmouth will expose a white mouth.
- Found near freshwater.
- Range does not extend further north than Virginia.

#### Northern Water Snake

*Nerodia sipedon*

- Distinguished by dark bands down its body, a narrow head, a slender body, a lack of facial pits, and round pupils.
- Adult length: 24-42 inches
- Coloration can be brown, reddish, gray, or black.
- Found near freshwater.
- Has a broad range across the Northeast.



#### Quick Tips:

- Venomous snakes are very rare in the Northeast.
- Snakes are shy creatures and will typically not attack unless disturbed.
- Venom is meant for prey, not protection.
- Non-venomous snakes will also vibrate their tails when agitated.
- All Northeastern species of venomous snakes have heat sensing facial pits and vertical pupils.

#### Why Are Snakes Important?

- Snakes are an essential part of ecosystems because they act as both predator and prey. Their absence can alter the balance of a food web.
- Snakes control populations of smaller animals. This directly impacts humans because smaller mammals can spread disease, for example the deer mouse that spreads Lyme disease.

### INJURED AND / OR ORPHANED WILDLIFE

Village staff has received numerous calls this spring regarding possibly abandoned wildlife, more specifically fawns. If you find a fawn, or other wildlife, in your yard please do not attempt to touch it, feed it or move it. The mother may be staying close by and will not come out of hiding if a human is hanging around. It is not uncommon for a mother to only return once or twice a day to check on their young, no matter how much noise the youngster is making. The NC Wildlife Service advises that young wildlife is not considered orphaned unless it has been at least 24 hours since the mother tended to it.

If you do find injured or orphaned wildlife on your property, you may contact the NC Wildlife Helpline at 866-318-2401. If necessary, they can provide the contact information for various licensed rehabilitators in the area.

## **CPR SAVE**

Fire Rescue Chief Rich Lambdin

On June 12, 2019 Chief Lambdin recognized three Fire Rescue Department personnel for their role in a CPR save. Following are outtakes of the presentation:

*First a little background. Our Department is dispatched to all medical emergencies within our fire district for the purpose of initiating patient care at the Basic Life Support (BLS) level until the arrival of Moore County EMS. We currently have 23 personnel that are certified by the state to function in this capacity as Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) and all of our personnel are trained in Cardio Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR).*

*In contrast, Moore County EMS is responsible for providing BLS and Advanced Life Support (ALS) care, as well as transport to the hospital. These units are always staffed with at least one state certified Paramedic, who are capable of utilizing advanced airway management techniques, IV therapy, cardiac monitors, and other ALS skills.*

*Another vital component of this chain of survival are the emergency medical dispatchers that are responsible for gathering critical information from 911 callers in stressful situations and promptly alerting the closest first responders of the emergency.*

*Tonight, we want to recognize the actions of first responders that worked cohesively as a team and resulted in a life being saved.*

*Specifically, on Thursday, May 2, 2019, at 11:05 a.m., Moore County Public Safety, received a 911 call reporting a medical emergency on Quiet Oak Road, just outside of Whispering Pines. Within seconds of the call, the Whispering Pines Fire Rescue Department (WPFRD) and Moore County EMS (Medic 50) were dispatched. The following personnel responded:*

*SQ51 (from Station 51)*

*Firefighter/EMT: Andrew Drummond*

*Firefighter/EMT: Corey Pope*

*WPFRD personnel in privately owned vehicle (POV) from home: Lieutenant/Firefighter/EMT Brooke Dozier*

*Medic 50*

*Paramedic Nicholas Bullard*

*Paramedic Sara Wood*

*At 11:11 a.m., 5 minute 23 seconds after dispatch, SQ51 arrived on scene to find an adult female in full cardiac arrest, which means she wasn't breathing and had no pulse. The crew, FF Drummond & FF Pope immediately assessed the patient and began administering high quality CPR, ventilating the patient, and administered Naloxone, also known as Narcan. Narcan is one of several medications that our EMTs can administer when certain patient indicators are present. In this case an unresponsive patient was an indicator for the use of*

*Narcan, which is a drug that blocks the effects of opioids. At 11:17 a.m., approximately 6 minutes after the arrival of SQ51, the patient regained a pulse.*

*Soon thereafter, Medic 50 arrived on scene to initiate Advanced Life Support (ALS) care. At this point each rescuer began taking turns ventilating the patient, maintaining an airway, administering medications and/or preparing the patient for transport.*

*At 11:24 a.m., approximately 19 minutes after receiving the 911 call, the patient was loaded for transport to Moore Regional Hospital, with Lieutenant Dozier driving Medic 50, which enabled the paramedics to focus on ALS care.*

*Subsequently, the patient was discharged from the hospital.*

*This outstanding outcome was a direct result of their training and teamwork, while sharing a common goal of providing the best possible care to the patient.*

*On behalf of the Village of Whispering Pines, I commend each of you for a job well done! Your actions reflect positively on each of you as individuals, as well as Moore County Public Safety & EMS and the Whispering Pines Fire Rescue Department as a whole.*

*Good job!*
