



## From the Desk of Chief Domonic Campbell November Monthly Report for Police Department

Date: December 3, 2019

### Special Notes

We collected 3.9 pounds of pills this month.

### Events of interest for the month of November 2019

1. **There were nineteen (19) incidents that were investigated this month. Of these incidents, twelve (12) involved an arrest with 27 total charges.**

*After an arrest, officers are unavailable for at least 2 hours while processing and booking subjects at the Moore County Jail in Carthage. Serving a criminal summons does not require detaining or taking the subject to jail.*

- **November 4<sup>th</sup> – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A Lakeview Drive resident reported finding a loose dog. An officer went to his residence to pick up the dog. The dog had a tag so the officer contacted the dog owner, who is a Lakeview Drive resident, and left a voicemail. Later an officer noticed that the dog owner was home and returned the dog to his owner. The dog owner was given a warning ticket for the violation since this was the first violation.
- **November 5<sup>th</sup> – Identity theft.** A resident of Periwinkle Drive reported that her credit card had been used to make 4 fraudulent purchases totaling \$329.00. The resident cancelled the credit card and was advised by an officer on how to place a credit freeze with credit bureaus.

- **November 6<sup>th</sup> – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A South Lakeshore Drive resident came to the police department with a dog that had been found running loose. The officer found a tag on the dog and contacted the dog owner, a South Lakeshore Drive resident. The dog owner came to the police department to pick up her dog. The dog owner was given a warning ticket since this was the first violation.
- **November 8<sup>th</sup> – Possession of cocaine and marijuana and having an open container in the passenger area of a vehicle.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer observed a clear bag with a white powder on the lap of one of the passengers. The officer searched the vehicle and found a bag of cocaine, marijuana, and open containers. The driver was issued citations for possession of marijuana, driving while license revoked, expired registration, and an inspection violation. One of the passengers was given a citation for having an open bottle of vodka in the passenger area of the vehicle. The second passenger was given a citation for having an open container of beer. This passenger was then placed under arrest for possession of cocaine and transported to the Moore County Jail.
- **November 9<sup>th</sup> – Simple assault and assault on a female.** A female called to report that she and her uncle had gotten into a physical altercation at a residence on Crows Nest. She stated that they were at her grandmother's home for an estate sale. She claims her uncle struck her and she struck him back and pushed him up against the wall. The officer advised that she would need to go to the Magistrate's Office to file charges. The officer then went to the residence to speak to the uncle. He also stated that they both got physical. He had some evidence of an injury. The officer also advised him to go to the Magistrate's Office to file charges. Both parties met with the Magistrate and obtained a criminal summons on the other. Officers contacted both parties and met with each one at different times to serve them with the criminal summons issued by the Magistrate.
- **November 10<sup>th</sup> – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Ray's Bridge Road reported that 3 dogs that belong to a neighbor came into his yard and tried to attack his dog. An officer went to the dog owner's residence. The dog owner was issued a civil penalty as this was the 2<sup>nd</sup> violation within the past year.
- **November 11<sup>th</sup> – Larceny.** A person reported that sod was taken from a residence under construction on Tucker Road. The sod had already been laid and someone pulled it up and tried to cover the area with pine straw. They also noticed that another home on Tucker Road had an area of freshly laid sod. The officer went to the residence with the freshly laid sod to inquire where the sod came from. Initially he was told they got it from a friend. However, after further questioning he admitted to taking the sod from the house under

construction because when this same builder built his home, they didn't put down any sod. He got angry when he saw the builder putting sod in at the new house. The officer then issued him a citation for misdemeanor larceny of the sod.

- **November 12<sup>th</sup> – Violation of Village ordinance (cat at large).** A resident of Morning Glory Lane reported capturing a cat that has been coming onto his property. An officer picked up the cat and brought it to the police department. It was then picked up by Moore County Animal Control.
- **November 12<sup>th</sup> – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident brought a dog to the police department that she found in her garage on Pine Ridge Drive. The officer took the dog and placed the dog in the kennel at the police department. The dog had a tag but the phone number was no longer in service. Later that day the dog owner, a Spearhead Drive resident, came to the police department to see if we had her dog. The officer returned the dog to the dog owner and issued her a warning ticket for the violation since this was the first offense.
- **November 12<sup>th</sup> – Possession of marijuana and maintain a vehicle for the use or sale of a controlled substance.** As a result of a traffic stop for failing to stop at a stop sign the officer detected a strong odor of marijuana coming from inside of the vehicle. The officer had the driver step out of vehicle and asked her if she had anything on her person. She removed two bags of marijuana from under her bra. Due to the large amount of marijuana, this was considered a felony violation. The officer issued the driver a citation for the stop sign violation and then placed her under arrest for felony possession of marijuana and for maintaining a vehicle for the use of or sale of a controlled substance. She was then transported to the Moore County Jail.
- **November 14<sup>th</sup> – Call for service.** An officer received a phone call from a female stating that her daughter was acting belligerent and that they were parked across from the St. Paul Lutheran Church on Niagara Carthage Road. She also said her 12 year old daughter was out of the car and walking down the side of the road. When officers arrived, they found both parents and the daughter. The mother and daughter got in an argument about the daughter's cell phone. The daughter got out of the vehicle and began walking. The father found her and stopped her from going any further. The officer discussed with the parents some options they had in dealing with their daughter.
- **November 14<sup>th</sup> – Violation of Village ordinance (barking dog).** A resident of Highland Drive reported a neighbor's dogs barking all the time. When the officer arrived, he also could hear the dogs barking.
- **November 14<sup>th</sup> – Arrest for failure to appear charges.** An officer observed a male subject that he was familiar with. When running his information, the officer determined that he had an order for arrest out of Moore County for

failure to appear on a larceny charge and possession of stolen goods. The subject was in a vehicle with two passengers. The officer checked out the passengers and determined that one of the passengers also had an order for arrest for failure to appear on several traffic charges. Both individuals were placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.

- **November 16<sup>th</sup> – Warrant service.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined that the driver had several outstanding processes from Moore County for identity theft, resisting a public officer, driving while license revoked, failure to appear on an identity theft charge, and two failure to appears on a obtaining property by false pretense charges. The officer issued the driver citations for fictitious plate, no insurance, no registration, inspection violation, driving while license revoked, and giving a false name to an officer. The driver was then placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.
- **November 21<sup>st</sup> – Orders for arrest for failure to appear.** An officer learned that a Ray’s Bridge Road resident had several orders for arrest out of Forsyth County for failure to appear on the following charges: operate vehicle with no insurance, revoked registration plate, driving while license revoked, possession of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia, and possession of drug paraphernalia. The officers arrested the resident and transported her to the Moore County Jail.
- **November 24<sup>th</sup> – Possession of marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer detected the odor of marijuana coming from inside the vehicle. The officer searched the vehicle and found a marijuana grinder and a smoking pipe. The officer photographed the items and then seized them for placement into evidence. The driver was given a citation for possession of marijuana paraphernalia and failing to stop at a stop sign.
- **November 25<sup>th</sup> – Damage to real property.** An officer was notified by Public Works that someone had damaged the basketball hoop at the Summerfield Park. The backboard had been shattered possibly by a rock or a BB gun.
- **November 26<sup>th</sup> – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** An officer observed a female walking on Sunset Drive with two dogs that were not on a leash. The officer advised the resident of the ordinance pertaining to dogs and issued the dog owner a warning ticket for the violation since this was the first violation.

## **2. There were four (4) traffic accidents in the Village this month.**

- **November 9<sup>th</sup>** – An accident occurred on Niagara Carthage Road. The driver was being inattentive and ran off the right shoulder of the roadway, striking a stop sign. There were no injuries and the vehicle was able to be driven from the scene. The driver received a citation for an unsafe movement.
- **November 14<sup>th</sup>** – An accident occurred at the intersection of Niagara Carthage Road and Vass Carthage Road. A vehicle stopped at the stop sign and then

proceeded striking a vehicle that was already in the intersection. The driver of the vehicle that proceeded forward striking the vehicle in the intersection was given a citation for an unsafe movement. No injuries were reported and one vehicle had to be towed from the scene.

- **November 18<sup>th</sup>** – An accident occurred on Airport Road at the intersection with Princess Gate Drive. One vehicle turned left in front of an oncoming vehicle. Both vehicles collided. The driver who turned in front of the oncoming vehicle was given a citation for an unsafe movement. The drivers of both vehicles were transported to Moore Regional Hospital with injuries. Both vehicles had to be towed from the scene.
- **November 22<sup>nd</sup>** – An accident occurred at the intersection of Niagara Carthage Road and Vass Carthage Road. A vehicle went through the stop sign and was struck by a vehicle that had just pulled out from a stop sign. No injuries were reported and both vehicles were able to be driven from the scene.

### **3. Safety (Department)**

- We continue to provide training for police staff above what is required.

### **4. Safety (Village)**

- Officers have performed numerous saturation patrols all month at the intersection of Niagara Carthage Road and Vass Carthage Road.

### **5. Other Events of Interest**

- **November 13<sup>th</sup>** – Lt. Dozier and Sgt. Graham attended the Strangulation and Sexual Assault Investigation Training at the Moore County District Attorney's Office in Carthage.
- **November 13<sup>th</sup>** – Lt. Dozier attended the monthly Investigators Meeting that was held at the Moore County District Attorney's Office in Carthage. Issues of common concern among local law enforcement agencies are discussed during these meetings.
- **November 21<sup>st</sup>** – Senior Officer Holt and Officer Hinson attended the SafeKids Annual Coalition meeting at the Clara McLean House in Pinehurst.

## GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

**Goal #1: To provide a uniform standard that will enable personnel of the department to be more consistent in procedures when handling situations.**

Daily briefings are being conducted by officers at shift changes. The Sergeant and Master Officer have also discussed monthly schedule and operational concerns with all officers this month.

There were no revised policies this month.

All officers completed policy reviews of General Order 033 – Evaluation Process for Officers-Employees and General Order 034 – Electronic Recording of Interrogations.

**Goal #2: To provide for education and further development of department personnel to enhance officer and department professionalism.**

Lt. Dozier attended the UNC School of Government's training regarding the Raise the Age Workshop on November 6<sup>th</sup> in Fayetteville.

Senior Officer McNeill completed the state mandated in service training 2019 Leadership and Professional Development on November 7<sup>th</sup>.

Officer Hinson successfully completed his DCI recertification on November 13<sup>th</sup> and is certified for another 2 years.

Senior Officer McNeill and Officer Hinson completed the one day training course Alco-Sensor training at Scotland County Economical Center in Laurinburg on November 14<sup>th</sup>.

Chief Campbell completed the state mandated in service Training 2019 Best Practices for Officers During Community Dissent course on November 13<sup>th</sup> and 2019 Law Enforcement Intelligence Update: Gangs, Divisive Groups on November 15<sup>th</sup>, 2019 Individual Wellness: Coping with Stress and PTSD on November 20<sup>th</sup>, 2019 Opioid Awareness and Response on November 21<sup>st</sup>, 2019 Domestic Violence: Law and Procedure Update on November 21<sup>st</sup>, and 2019 Juvenile Law Update on November 25<sup>th</sup>.

Officer Hinson completed the state mandated in service training 2019 Leadership and Professional Development on November 24<sup>th</sup>.

**Goal #3: Provide for a higher degree of personal contact between community and department personnel.**

Officers welcomed 8 new residents this month and provided the new residents with a police "Welcome Packet" describing many of the services offered by our department.

**Goal #5: Continue current crime prevention programs to maintain the Village's low crime statistics.**

We continue to be fully staffed.

We have added another senior to our Senior Call In Program this month bringing the total to 12 seniors in the Senior Call In Program.

We provided the new The Pitch with stats from November.

We have 5 certified child seat technicians. 4 officers and the Sergeant are certified child seat technicians.

**Goal #6: Proactive approach in looking for safety concerns.**

In our efforts to meet OSHA requirements, quarterly and yearly reviews of the Infectious Disease Control Plan have been scheduled. The next quarterly review will be scheduled for December 2019.
