Special Notes

We collected 8.3 pounds of pills this month. For the entire year of 2018 we collected 43.27 pounds of pills.

Sgt. Graham and Officer Hinson participated in a school lockdown drill at Farm Life Elementary School on January 10th.

**Officer Dakota Hinson was acknowledged at the January 9th Council Meeting by Village Manager, Rich Lambdin, for his part in assisting an adult male driver who had a medical emergency while driving that resulted in a vehicle accident. Officer Hinson and members of the Fire/Rescue Department, upon arrival at the scene, assumed responsibility for CPR and ventilating the patient to allow the paramedics to focus on advanced life support care. The patient was transported to the hospital after receiving quality CPR and advanced life support care at the scene. The patient was subsequently discharged from the hospital and is home progressing with his recovery. Officer Hinson, along with the other first responders, were commended for the outstanding outcome that resulted from the teamwork they displayed in ensuring the best possible care to the patient. **

Events of interest for the month of January 2019

1. **There were forty-one (41) incidents that were investigated this month. Of these incidents, seven (7) involved an arrest with 15 total charges.**

After an arrest, officers are unavailable for at least 2 hours while processing and booking subjects at the Moore County Jail in Carthage. Serving a criminal summons does not require detaining or taking the subject to jail.

- **January 2nd – Possession of marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer detected the odor of marijuana coming from inside the vehicle. The officer searched the vehicle and found a glass smoking pipe with burnt marijuana residue inside it. The officer photographed the pipe and then seized it for placement into evidence. The driver was issued a citation for speeding and for possession of marijuana paraphernalia.
- **January 3rd – Failure to appear on a failure to extinguish fire charge.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined that the driver had an active order for arrest out of Harnett County for failing to appear on a failure to extinguish fire charge. The officer issued the driver a warning ticket for the speeding violation. The officer then placed the driver under arrest and transported him to the Moore County Jail.
- **January 3rd – Obtain property by false pretense and identity theft.** A woman reported that someone had fraudulently used her son's bank card at the Food Lion. She contacted Food Lion and they found security footage of the person who made the purchase. An officer went to Food Lion to view the security footage. The officer also spoke with the cashier who handled the transaction. The male used two cards, that both had the victim's banking information, to pay for the items which totaled about \$66.00. The male then left the store walking. Security footage also captured a vehicle the man left it. The victim has had the bank shut down the account so no further fraudulent purchases can be made.
- **January 4th – Criminal summons for cyberstalking.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined that the driver of the vehicle had an active criminal summons out of Moore County for cyberstalking. The officer advised the driver and served him with the criminal summons and advised the driver of his court date.
- **January 4th – Possession with intent to sell/deliver a Schedule IV controlled substance, maintain a vehicle/place for use, storage, or sale of a controlled substance, simple possession of a Schedule IV controlled substance, simple possession of a Schedule VI controlled substance, possession of drug**

- paraphernalia, and possession of marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop, the officer detected the odor of marijuana when he approached the vehicle. The driver admitted to having a marijuana bowl in the vehicle. The officer searched the vehicle and found the marijuana bowl, a grinder, marijuana, and Xanax pills. The officer photographed the items and then seized the items for placement into evidence. The driver was then placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail. In addition to all of the drug charges, the driver was issued citations for driving while license revoked, no vehicle registration, no vehicle inspection, no insurance, and fictitious plate.
- **January 5th – Criminal summons for driving while license revoked.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined that a passenger in the vehicle had an active criminal summons out of Moore County for driving while license revoked. The officer advised the passenger and served the passenger with the criminal summons. Also, the officer advised the passenger of her court date.
 - **January 6th – Verbal dispute.** A resident of Pine Lake Drive reported hearing neighbors arguing very loudly and could hear stuff being thrown around. When officers arrived, they found a man outside of the house. He advised that he was the homeowner and that he and his girlfriend had been arguing. Nothing physical occurred. The officers also spoke with the girl friend who advised that they were just having a verbal argument. It was decided she would sleep in another room for the night. Both parties had been drinking earlier and neither was in any condition to drive. They agreed to go to sleep in separate rooms for the night.
 - **January 6th – Violation of Village ordinance (barking dog).** A resident of Pine Ridge Drive reported that a neighbor's dog was barking and would not stop. When the officer arrived, he could hear the barking dog. The officer then went to the dog owner's residence on Ray's Bridge Road and spoke with the dog owner. The dog owner admitted that the dog had been barking some. The officer issued the dog owner a warning ticket for the violation as this was a first offense.
 - **January 15th – Obtain property by false pretense.** A resident of Winding Trail reported that he received a phone call from someone claiming to be his daughter's fiancé and he needed help after getting into an accident in Mexico. The person claimed he needed \$2,000 to pay for medical bills. The caller told him to go to Home Depot and get \$2,000 in gift cards and then call him back with the numbers on the cards. The resident went and purchased the gift cards and then called back and read the numbers off of all the gift cards. The following day the resident received another call and the caller said he needed \$1,800 more. The resident went to his bank to take money out of his account and the teller advised him that this may be a scam and he should call the police. The resident then called his daughter and found out that her fiancé was not in

- Mexico and he was fine. The officer gathered all of the information from the resident and the resident was given information relating to current scams and things he could do to protect himself in the future.
- **January 16th – Natural death.** An officer received a in reference to a CPR in progress call at a residence on Pine Ridge Drive. The officer was the first responder to arrive at the residence. He found an elderly female slumped over the rail of her bed. Her husband had been unable to move her off the rail to attempt to perform CPR. The officer removed the female from the bed and onto the floor and was unable to detect any pulse or breath, but the officer began CPR. The Whispering Pines Fire Rescue Department and EMS arrived. They were unable to get a pulse back and pronounced the patient as deceased. The officer assisted the husband by contacting the funeral home for him and waited with him until the funeral home arrived.
 - **January 16th – Breaking and entering.** A resident of Birdie Drive reported that she thought someone might be breaking into her home. When an officer arrived, the homeowner was standing outside the residence. The officer checked the door that the homeowner said would have been used to get into the garage but the door was locked. The homeowner said that she saw the door knob moving on the door that leads from the garage into the home. Officers cleared the residence and the garage. They also checked around the exterior of the house and found no one or any signs of a break in.
 - **January 16th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Tomahawk Court reported finding a loose dog in his yard. An officer picked up the dog and placed the dog in the pen at the police department. The owner of the dog, a Hammerstone Circle resident, came back later the same evening to pick up her dog. The owner was giving a warning ticket for the violation since this was the first offense.
 - **January 19th – Simple possession of marijuana and possession of marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer detected the odor of marijuana coming from inside the vehicle. The officer conducted a search of the vehicle and found a plastic bag with marijuana in it and cigarillos. The officer photographed the items and then seized the items for placement into evidence. The driver was issued citations for driving while license revoked, simple possession of marijuana and possession of marijuana paraphernalia.
 - **January 19th – Verbal domestic.** A resident of Ray's Bridge Road called 911 asking for an officer and the 911 operator could hear a male screaming and yelling in the background. When the officer arrived, the female indicated she was upset with her husband. They were arguing but nothing physical had occurred. Both parties agreed to stay apart for the remainder of the night.
 - **January 20th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Victoria Drive reported finding a loose dog in his yard. The officer went and

- picked up the dog. The dog was placed in the kennel at the police department. The dog did not have a collar or a tag. A short time later a Victoria Drive resident called to report his dog missing. The officer advised he had the dog. The dog owner came to pick up his dog and the officer issued the dog owner a warning ticket since this was the first violation.
- **January 22nd – Found property.** One of the garbage men found a set of keys on Snapper Drive and turned them in at Village Hall. An officer picked up the keys and noticed an Audi fob on the key chain. The officer looked in the area where the keys were found to see if she could locate an Audi vehicle, but didn't find one. The keys were placed into evidence until the owner of the keys can be found.
 - **January 22nd – Damage to property.** A resident of South Lakeshore Drive wanted to file a report for damage done to her vehicle while parked in her driveway. The resident felt the garbage man damaged her vehicle. An officer looked at the trash trucks and neither of them had any signs of damage or paint transfer. Both parties were advised that this was a civil matter.
 - **January 23rd – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Pine Ridge Drive reported German Shepherds running loose in his yard. The resident was stuck in his car because the dogs were aggressive. An officer arrived and also noticed the dogs were somewhat aggressive. The officer was able to get the dogs back into their fenced in back yard. The dog owners were not home at that time, but the officer returned later and issued the dog owner a warning ticket since this was the first violation.
 - **January 27th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of South Lakeshore Drive reported a loose dog in her yard. An officer went and picked up the dog and placed the dog in the pen at the police department. The officer recognized the dog. The following day the dog owner, who is a Fairway Lane resident, came to pick up his dog. The officer issued the dog owner a civil penalty as this was the dog owner's fourth violation in the last year.
 - **January 27th – Found property.** While in the process of investigating numerous vehicle break ins a Shadow Lane resident reported finding a bicycle parked in her yard that did not belong to her family. The officer seized the bicycle and placed the bicycle in the property room. An officer went to a residence on Shadow Lane and was showing images of the found bicycle and the resident advised it was his son's bicycle. The resident picked up the bicycle from the police department.
 - **January 27th – Larceny from motor vehicle.** Our department received a total of 16 reports of larceny from a motor vehicle that occurred on Shadow Lane, Par Drive, and Hardee Lane. Residents reported that only vehicles that were unlocked were entered. The contents inside of the vehicles was strewn around but the only thing taken was loose change and cash, in most cases. There was no

- physical damage to any of the vehicles. Officers photographed all of the scenes and also dusted for fingerprints as well. Officers are also trying to contact residents in the area to see if they may have any security camera footage that may have caught something.
- **January 28th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Lakeview Drive reported that she found 2 loose dogs and was holding them in her garage. A Herons Brook Drive resident had called earlier about her 2 dogs that go away from her residence. The officer called the dog owner and had her meet him at the residence on Lakeview Drive. The officer assisted the dog owner in retrieving her dogs. The officer issued the dog owner a civil penalty for this violation as this was the 4th violation in the past year.
 - **January 28th – Failure to appear on an attempt to obtain property by false pretense charge.** An officer became aware of an outstanding order for arrest, out of Harnett County, for a Cardinal Drive resident. The officer went to the residence and advised the resident of the order for arrest. He was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.
 - **January 29th – Found property.** A resident of Shadow Lane reporting finding an Apple iPad outside of her residence. The officer went to the scene to retrieve the iPad. The officer checked to see if anyone reported a missing iPad from any of the vehicle break ins from a few days earlier, but no one had reported one missing.
 - **January 30th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A Niagara Carthage resident reported that while out running she was chased by a dog that was acting aggressively. The dog kept nipping at her ankles. A motorist stopped to help her get away. The resident told the officer which house the dog came from while she was out running. The officer went to the dog owner's residence and the woman at the residence admitted to letting the dog out and knowing that the dog jumps the fence too. The resident was given a warning ticket for the violation as this was the first violation.

2. There were four (4) traffic accidents in the Village this month.

- **January 3rd** – An accident occurred on NC Hwy 22 (in front of Food Lion). A deer ran into the roadway colliding with a vehicle. There were no injuries and the vehicle were able to be driven from the scene.
- **January 11th** – An accident occurred at the intersection of Niagara Carthage Road and Vass Carthage Road. One of the vehicles pulled out from a stop sign in the path of an oncoming vehicle. The impact pushed the vehicles into another vehicle that was stopped at a stop sign. The driver of the vehicle that pulled out in front of an oncoming vehicle was given a citation for an unsafe movement. There were no injuries reported. Two of the three vehicles involved in this accident had to be towed from the scene.

- **January 22nd** – An accident occurred in the Food Lion parking lot. A vehicle began backing out of a parking space and struck a vehicle that was traveling in a travel lane causing damage to the vehicle. There were no injuries reported and both vehicles were able to be driven from the scene.
- **January 23rd** – An accident occurred in the Food Lion parking lot. Driver of a parked vehicle opened a door and struck a vehicle parked adjacent to the vehicle causing damage. No injuries were reported.

3. Safety (Department)

- We continue to provide training for police staff above what is required.

4. Safety (Village)

- Officers have performed numerous saturation patrols on roads where complaints have been received about speeding violations.

5. Other Events of Interest

- **January 4th** – Chief Campbell attended the Celebration of Life for Jack Armstrong.
- **January 8th** – Lt. Dozier attended the monthly Multi-Disciplinary Team (MDT) meeting held at the MC Child Advocacy Center in Carthage. Recent cases involving children, that are being investigated by law enforcement agencies in the county, were discussed.
- **January 9th** – Chief Campbell and Lt. Dozier attended the monthly Investigators Meeting that was hosted by our department this month. Local law enforcement agencies discuss issues of common concern during these meetings.
- **January 11th** – Senior Officer Holt attended a traffic task force meeting at the Pinehurst Police Department. Our department also earned 25 points in the NC GHSP Step Reporting Program for attending this meeting.
- **January 14th** – Officer Strickland attended a lock down drill at New Century Middle School.
- **January 15th** – Lt. Dozier attended the Moore County Sexual Assault/Domestic Violence Task Force meeting.
- **January 30th** – Sgt. Graham attended the Shamrock ‘N’ Roll Race meeting that was held at Village Hall.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Goal #1: To provide a uniform standard that will enable personnel of the department to be more consistent in procedures when handling situations.

Daily briefings are being conducted by officers at shift changes. The Lieutenant and Sergeant have also discussed monthly schedule and operational concerns with all officers this month.

General Order 013 - Juvenile Operations and Procedures was revised this month. This policy was revised to reflect the change in the state statute that now states that when juveniles are less than 16 years of age (use to be under the age of 15), no in-custody admission or confession resulting from interrogation may be admitted into evidence unless the confession or admission was made in the presence of the juvenile's parents, guardian, custodian, or attorney.

All officers completed policy reviews of General Order 013 – Juvenile Operations and Procedures and General Order 014 – Missing Persons.

Goal #2: To provide for education and further development of department personnel to enhance officer and department professionalism.

All officers viewed a training video about a hospital shooting. The purpose of the video is to cover the aftermath of a critical incident and what officers should be thinking about and doing while on scene.

Officer Howard completed the following 2019 mandated in service training classes this month: 2019 Opioid Awareness and Response, 2019 Legal Update, 2019 Best Practices for Officers During Community Dissent, 2019 Individual Wellness: Coping With Stress and PTSD, and 2019 Juvenile Law Update

Lt. Dozier completed the following 2019 mandated in service training classes this month: 2019 Individual Wellness: Coping With Stress and PTSD, 2019 Opioid Awareness and Response, 2019 Best Practices for Officers During Community Dissent, and 2019 Juvenile Law Update

Senior Officer Holt completed the following 2019 mandated in service training classes this month: 2019 Opioid Awareness and Response, 2019 Individual Wellness: Coping With Stress and PTSD, 2019 Best Practices for Officers During Community Dissent, and 2019 Juvenile Law Update.

Senior Officer McNeill completed School Bus Safety, Emergency Transport, Vehicle Safety 201, and Vacation Travel Safety continuing education classes that are required for Child Seat Technicians to renew their certification, on January 12th.

Sgt. Graham completed Fact or Fiction March 2018 and CPS in Pickup Trucks on line classes on January 13th. These online continuing education classes are required for Child Seat Technicians to renew their certification.

Goal #3: Provide for a higher degree of personal contact between community and department personnel.

Officers welcomed 5 new residents this month and provided the new residents with a “Welcome Packet” describing many of the services offered by our police department.

Goal #4: Conduct special enforcement programs and participate in GHSP campaigns.

Officers conducted a checkpoint on Niagara Carthage Road on January 2nd. A total of 2 citations were issued, one for driving while license revoked, and one for no operating license. Our department also earned 50 points in the GHSP Step Reporting Program for conducting this checkpoint.

Officers conducted a checkpoint on Ray’s Bridge Road on January 15th. A total of 3 citations were issued during this checkpoint. 2 of the citations were for driving with no operating license. Our department also earned 50 points in the GHSP Step Reporting Program for conducting this checkpoint.

One of our officers participated in a speed enforcement campaign in Cameron on January 18th. This officer is part of a traffic task force and our participation earns our department additional points in the NC GHSP Step Reporting Program. Our department earned 150 points for our participation in this event.

Our department also participated in a checkpoint that was held in Carthage on January 18th. Our department earned 50 points in the NC GHSP Step Reporting Program for our participation in this checkpoint.

Our department conducted a checkpoint on Ray’s Bridge Road on January 19th. The Carthage Police Department participated in our checkpoint. 4 citations were issued during our hour long checkpoint and we also earned 50 points in the NC GHSP Step Reporting Program for conducting this checkpoint.

Our department participated in a checkpoint in Carthage on January 19th. Our department earned 50 points in the NC GHSP Step Reporting Program for our participation in this event.

Goal #5: Continue current crime prevention programs to maintain the Village's low crime statistics.

We remain fully staffed.

A traffic complaint was received in December about speeding on Pine Lake Drive. Officers conducted 10 speed surveys in the area. During these speed surveys one citation was issued for a speeding violation. The citation was for traveling 37 mph in a 25 mph zone. Officers also conducted a license check in the area. This was conducted so residents and visitors could see the police presence in the area which hopefully will help reduce the speeding issue.

Additional traffic complaints were received regarding speeding on Spearhead Drive, Pine Crest Drive, Brightleaf Drive, and Pine Lake Drive. Officers have been conducting saturation patrols on all of these roads. A total of 26 saturation patrols were conducted on the 5 roads this month. One citation was written for speeding on Pine Lake Drive and 3 warning tickets for speeding were given on Spearhead and Hardee Lane.

Officers have conducted:

House checks – 503 (average 16 a day)

Business checks – 1,107

Store closings – 59

Food Lion foot patrols - 69

We continue to have 9 seniors in the Senior Call In Program.

We provided the new The Pitch with stats from December and an article about the Chief's Award being awarded last month to Mary Wehking.

We have 5 certified child seat technicians. 4 officers and the Sergeant are certified child seat technicians.

Goal #6: Proactive approach in looking for safety concerns.

In our efforts to meet OSHA requirements, quarterly and yearly reviews of the Infectious Disease Control Plan have been scheduled. The next quarterly review will be scheduled for March 2019.
