



From the Desk of Chief Domonic Campbell Monthly Report for Police Department

Date: May 1, 2018

Special Notes

We collected 3.5 pounds of pills this month.

Our department received a \$250.00 grant reimbursement this month from the North Carolina League of Municipalities (NCLM) Soft Body Armor Program for a replacement bulletproof vest for one of our officers. We received another reimbursement from the federal Bulletproof Vest Program (BVP) in January for \$374.98.

Master Officer Tate and Lt. Dozier received a call about an otter that may have been injured. They went to the scene and found a baby otter. The otter was not injured. However, the otter would not return to the water and kept following the officers. Concerned that the otter would get hurt they brought the otter to the police department and contacted Susan Campbell. She was able to find an organization out of Winston-Salem that would take the baby otter. They had the otter checked out and it was determined that the otter was healthy and about 8 – 10 weeks old. The otter is not yet weaned so they are having to bottle feed the otter for now. This organization already had an otter that is lonely and they hope that both otters will bond. They have nicknamed the baby otter “Whisper.”



On April 21st St. Paul Lutheran Church hosted a spaghetti dinner for first responders. Chief Campbell, Sgt. Graham, and Senior Officer Holt attended the dinner.

We celebrated Lt. Dozier's birthday this month.

Events of interest for the month of April 2018

1. There were seventeen (17) incidents that were investigated this month.

- **April 1st – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Tomahawk Court reported that some people were out riding in a golf cart and allowing their dogs to run loose. The dogs belong to a resident of Brightleaf Drive. The officer went to the dog owner's residence and the dog owner verified that he had allowed his dogs to run around without a leash. The dog owner was given a warning ticket for this violation since this was the first violation.
- **April 3rd – Possession of cocaine, marijuana, and marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop for an expired registration the officer noticed a marijuana cigarette remnant when he approached the driver of the car. The officer searched the vehicle and found cocaine hidden inside of a cigarillo, a bag of marijuana, and a pack of cigarillos. These items were photographed and then seized for placement into evidence. Neither the driver of the vehicle or the passenger would admit the drugs belonged to them. The officer advised he would charge both individuals with possession of cocaine, marijuana, and marijuana paraphernalia. They were then placed under arrest.
- **April 3rd – Failure to appear.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined that the driver had an active order for arrest for failure to appear. The driver was placed under arrest.
- **April 4th – Damage to property.** A resident reported that her vehicle was struck by a golf ball while driving on Memorial Causeway. The windshield was damaged. The person that had hit the golf ball advised that it was not intentional but he had hit a terrible shot.
- **April 4th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A caller advised that there was a loose dog running around on Pine Ridge Drive and the dog belongs to a resident of Ray's Bridge Road. The officer went to the Ray's Bridge Road residence and the dog owner admitted that the dog had run off and she had been unable to catch the dog. The dog owner was given a warning ticket as this was the first violation in the past year.
- **April 4th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** An officer received a call about a loose dog on Country Club Blvd. When the officer arrived, he saw someone putting the dog into a truck. The officer asked the driver if the dog was hers and she said yes. The dog owner was issued a warning ticket for this violation since this was the first violation within the past year.
- **April 5th – Simple assault.** An officer received a call about a disturbance at a Goldenrod Drive residence. Upon arrival the officer learned that two brothers had been arguing and when one of the brothers tried to leave the room the other

brother pulled him back. One of the brothers has a development disorder that causes him to get angry at times. No one in the household wanted to press charges. The officer advised the mother and both of the brothers about their option to go see the Magistrate if they chose to do so.

- **April 10th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Morning Glory Lane reported a loose dog in his yard. The officer went to the residence and picked up the dog and placed the dog in the police department kennel. A little while later a woman called to see if anyone had found her dog. She came to the police department to pick up her dog and the officer issued the dog owner a warning ticket since this was the first violation in the past year.
- **April 16th – Possession of marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop for speeding the officer detected the odor of marijuana inside the vehicle. The officer also observed a grinder sitting in the center console. The officer searched the vehicle but only found the grinder. The officer photographed and then seized the grinder for placement into evidence. The driver was issued a citation for speeding and possession of marijuana paraphernalia.
- **April 16th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** Someone found a dog running loose on Shadow Drive. They brought the dog to the police department and the dog was placed into the kennel. The dog owner was contacted and he came to pick up his dog. The dog owner, who is a Shadow Lane resident, was issued a warning ticket as this was his first violation.
- **April 17th – Larceny.** A resident of Lakeview Drive reported that someone had taken some prescription pain pills from a medicine cabinet in his guest bathroom. The resident believes that one of the construction workers working on his house took approximately 118 pain pills from his prescription bottle.
- **April 17th – Lost property.** A resident of Spearhead Drive lost her military ID card and needed a police report in order to get a replacement ID card.
- **April 17th – Failure to appear.** An officer determined during a traffic stop that a passenger in the vehicle had 2 active orders for failure to appear. The passenger was placed under arrest.
- **April 26th – 50B property hold.** A resident of South Lakeshore Drive obtained a restraining order and the judge ordered her to turn over some items to our police department where the defendant could then pick them up later at the police department. A friend dropped off the items listed to our officer. The officer provided a receipt for the items and the defendant came to the police department to collect all of the items.
- **April 26th – Violation of Village ordinance (barking dog).** A resident of Goldenrod Drive reported a dog barking on Dewberry late at night and during the daytime. An officer went to the area and was able to find the home and hear the dogs barking. The officer issued the dog owner a warning ticket for the violation as this was the first offense.

- **April 25th – Assault on a female.** A resident of Cardinal Drive reported that she had been involved in a domestic violence incident. The resident stated that her husband grabbed her wrist and pushed her away almost making her fall. The officer could see a mark on her wrist and a cut on her finger. The husband also indicated that he grabbed and pushed his wife. The husband was placed under arrest for assaulting a female.
- **April 30th – Possession of marijuana.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer detected the odor of marijuana coming from inside the vehicle. The officer found numerous empty cigarillo wrappers in the vehicle. The officer also found a partially smoked marijuana cigarette in the vehicle. The officer photographed and then seized the items for placement into evidence. The driver was issued a citation for possession of marijuana and driving while license revoked for an impaired revocation.

2. There were ten (10) arrests this month with a total of 22 charges.

After an arrest, officers are unavailable for at least 2 hours while processing and booking subjects at the Moore County Jail in Carthage. Serving a criminal summons does not require detaining or taking the subject to jail.

- **April 3rd** – As a result of a traffic stop for speeding the officer determined that the driver had two orders for arrest, one out of Nash County for failure to appear on a simple assault charge and one out of Edgecombe County for failure to appear on a simple worthless check charge. The driver was given a warning ticket for speeding and then she was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.
- **April 3rd – (2 arrests).** As a result of a traffic stop and a search of the vehicle the officer found cocaine, marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia in the vehicle. Neither the driver or passenger would admit the drugs belonged to them. The officer advised that if one of them didn't claim the drugs as theirs then they would both be charged. Neither would claim the drugs. So, the officer placed both the driver and the passenger under arrest and transported them to the Moore County Jail. Both were charged with possession of cocaine, marijuana, and marijuana paraphernalia.
- **April 4th – (2 arrests).** An investigation into a December 21st larceny case and a March 15th breaking and entering case, both of which occurred at the same residence on Lakeview Drive, resulted in identifying a Pinehurst resident as the offender. Criminal summonses were obtained on the subject and were served by Pinehurst Police Department.
- **April 12th** – Our department had warrants out on a female, back from January 2018, and the warrants were served by the Moore County Sheriff's Office at the Detention Center. The warrants were for identity theft, fictitious information to an officer, resisting a public officer, driving while license revoked, and

possession of drug paraphernalia. At the time of the initial traffic stop back in January, the female driver gave the officer a fictitious name and her true identity was later determined.

- **April 16th** – As a result of a traffic stop for speeding the driver was also charged with possession of marijuana paraphernalia and was arrested by citation for the violation.
- **April 17th** – As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined that the passenger in the vehicle had two active orders for arrest. One was out of Bladen County for failure to appear on a driving while license revoked charge and revoked registration plate violation. The other was out of Robeson County for failure to appear on a driver while license revoked charge and no insurance charge. The passenger was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.
- **April 26th** – A resident of Cardinal Drive reported that her husband had grabbed her wrist pushing her away. The officer could see a mark on her wrist and a cut on her finger. The husband admitted to grabbing his wife's wrist and pushing her away. The officer placed the husband under arrest and transported him to the Moore County Jail.
- **April 30th** – As a result of a traffic stop and subsequent search of the vehicle, the officer found a partially smoked marijuana cigarette in the vehicle. The driver was arrested and released by citation. The officer issued a citation for possession of marijuana and driving while license revoked for an impaired revocation.

3. There were two (2) traffic accidents in the Village this month.

- **April 19th** – An accident occurred on Niagara Carthage Road. A vehicle stopped at the stop sign and then pulled up a little more to check for vehicles. The vehicle behind assumed the vehicle was going to proceed through the intersection and struck the rear of the stopped vehicle. The driver of the vehicle that rear ended the other vehicle was given a citation for failing to reduce speed. No injuries were reported and both vehicles were able to be driven from the scene.
- **April 30th** – A resident of Lakeview Drive reported that a vehicle struck their mailbox and left the scene of the crash.

4. Safety (Department)

- The department continues to provide training to officers.

5. Safety (Village)

- Officers have conducted numerous saturation patrols this month on Pine Ridge Drive, Shadow Drive, Lakeview Drive, Windsong Place, Sandpiper Drive, Birdie Drive, and Spearhead Drive this month.

6. Other Events of Interest

- **April 4th – 6th** – Chief Campbell and Sgt. Graham attended the Management Development Program Alumni Association Conference in Wilmington. The following presentations were presented: The Opioid Epidemic, Human Trafficking, and Leadership for a Lifetime: How the Past Prepares Us for the Future.
- **April 11th** – Lt. Dozier attended the monthly Investigators Meeting that was held at the Aberdeen Police Department. Issues of common concern are discussed among local law enforcement agencies at these meetings.
- **April 17th** – Officer Hinson participated in a lockdown drill at Union Pines High School with Moore County Schools Police, Moore County Sheriff's Office, and Carthage Police Department.
- **April 29th** – Master Officer Tate and Police Administrator, Lisa Weaver, attended a Celebration of Life for a Senior Call In that passed away this month.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Goal #1: To provide a uniform standard that will enable personnel of the department to be more consistent in procedures when handling situations.

Objective #1: Daily briefings are being conducted by officers at shift changes. The Lieutenant and Sergeant have also discussed monthly schedule and operational concerns with all officers this month.

Objective #2: There were no revised policies this month.

Objective #3: All officers completed policy reviews of General Order 038 – Infectious Disease Control Program and General Order 039 – Department Computer Usage.

Goal #2: To provide for education and further development of department personnel to enhance officer and department professionalism.

Objective #1: Master Officer Tate completed the mandated in-service training 2017 Strategies to Improve Law Enforcement Interactions and Relationships with Minority Youth on April 1st.

Officer Strickland completed the mandated in-service training 2018 Strategies to Improve Law Enforcement Interactions and Relationships with Minority Youth on April 1st and also completed Officer Safety: Surviving Planned Attacks Against Law Enforcement Officers on April 2nd.

Lt. Dozier successfully completed the DCI Criminal Record Inquiries recertification test on April 3rd and is now recertified for another 2 years.

Lt. Dozier and Sgt. Graham attended the Use of Force Risk Management course on April 10th.

Senior Officer Holt successfully completed the Domestic Terrorism class on April 25th at Randolph Community College.

All police department personnel completed the Alcohol-Free Workplace training this month that was required by the Village.

Goal #3: Provide for a higher degree of personal contact between community and department personnel.

Objective #1: There were no community events this month.

Senior Officer Holt and Officer Hinson gave a presentation to a Girl Scout troop at Eureka Presbyterian Church. The officers answered questions and also gave them a tour of the patrol cars.

Objective #2: Officers welcomed 12 new residents this month and provided the new residents with a police “Welcome Packet” describing many of the services offered by our department.

Objective #3: There were no requests for Child IDs this month.

Objective #4: Chief Campbell and Senior Officer Holt attended the monthly LEO meeting on April 26th.

Objective #5: There were no requests for installation of child seats this month.

Goal #4: Conduct special enforcement programs and participate in GHSP campaigns.

Objective #1: Our department conducted two checkpoints on April 6th. A morning checkpoint was conducted on Hardee Lane and a total of 3 citations were written (1 for no insurance, 1 for expired registration, and 1 for an inspection violation) during this checkpoint. An afternoon checkpoint was conducted on Banning Drive and 1 citation was written for driving while license revoked during this checkpoint. Conducting these checkpoints earned our department 100 points in the GHSP Step Reporting Program.

Another checkpoint was conducted on April 20th on Niagara Carthage Road. One citation was written during this hour-long checkpoint. We also earned 50 points in the GHSP Step Reporting Program for conducting this checkpoint.

A saturation patrol was conducted on Ray's Bridge Road using the LIDAR on April 26th. The officer wrote 1 citation for speeding and issued 1 warning ticket for speeding. We also earned a total of 50 points in the GHSP Step Reporting Program for conducting this event.

Goal #5: Continue current crime prevention programs to maintain the Village's low crime statistics.

Objective #1: We remain fully staffed.

Objective #2: A traffic complaint was received about speeding on Pine Ridge Drive this month. Officers completed 9 saturation patrols on this road. One citation was issued for speeding and one warning ticket was issued for speeding.

Traffic complaints were received about Spearhead Drive – one in February and one in March. One complaint was about speeding and the other complaint was about cars passing stopped school buses. Officers conducted a total of ten saturation patrols on this road and no tickets were issued for speeding or passing stopped school buses. Officers also conducted two separate checkpoints on this road in February and March. In addition, the officer conducted a lidar operation on Spearhead Drive in an effort to slow down vehicles. Officers will continue to enforce the speed limit in this area.

A traffic complaint was received about speeding on Windsong Place. Officers completed 10 saturation patrols on this road but did not issue any tickets as no violations were observed. Also, a checkpoint was conducted on this road. Officers will continue to enforce the speed limit in this area.

Objective #3: Officers have conducted:
House checks – 549 (average 18 a day)
Business checks – 1,026
Store closings – 53

We now have a total of 9 seniors in the Senior Call In Program as sadly one of our seniors passed away this month.

Objective #4: Our department submitted several articles for the Village newsletter: open house flyer, internet purchase exchange site, house numbers on mailboxes, use of parks/lakes, kayakers/paddle boarders/canoeists using Thagard Lake, dogs in Village parks, residence checks and senior call in program.

Objective #5: Officers have conducted 60 foot patrols at the Food Lion Shopping Center this month.

Objective #6: No traffic studies were conducted this month.

Objective #7: We have 6 certified child seat technicians. 5 officers and the Sergeant are certified child seat technicians.

Objective #8: Our department had an update installed to our Record Management System that now allows us to transition our Uniform Crime Reporting data to the National Incident Based Reports System (NIBRS). The state has decided that all agencies must transition to this new system this year. This update has made significant changes in the way officers enter information for incident and arrest reports.

Goal #6: Proactive approach in looking for safety concerns.

Objective#1: The department continues to provide training to officers.

Objective #2: Officers have conducted numerous saturation patrols this month on Pine Ridge Drive, Shadow Drive, Lakeview Drive, Windsong Place, Sandpiper Drive, Birdie Drive, and Spearhead Drive this month.

Objective #3: In our efforts to meet OSHA requirements, quarterly and yearly reviews of the Infectious Disease Control Plan have been scheduled. The next quarterly review is scheduled for June 2018.

Goal #7: Seek a new camera system for vehicle and body worn cameras.

Objective #1: The new in-car camera system and management system has been installed and is working well.

Goal #8: Continue to participate in the Village's ongoing recycling program.

Objective #1: The police department continues to participate in the Village recycling program.
