Events of interest for the month of October 2019

1. **There were twenty-one (21) incidents that were investigated this month. Of these incidents, nine (9) involved an arrest with 14 total charges.**

After an arrest, officers are unavailable for at least 2 hours while processing and booking subjects at the Moore County Jail in Carthage. Serving a criminal summons does not require detaining or taking the subject to jail.

- **October 1st – Financial identity theft.** A resident of Shadow Lane reported that he was the victim of multiple online frauds and his credit card had been compromised. He then received an email from an online vendor about some items that were still in the shopping cart. The resident was able to see the shopping cart and determine that someone was using his information to buy items and have them shipped to an address in Alabama. The resident contacted the local police department in Alabama but was told he had to report it to his local police department first.
- **October 1st – Active warrant for arrest for a domestic violence protection order violation.** An officer was aware of an active arrest warrant out of Robeson County for a female that was driving a vehicle in front of the officer. The officer initiated a traffic stop and confirmed the driver's identity. The driver was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.
- **October 1st – Active warrant for arrest for stalking.** An officer saw a female driving a vehicle that his was familiar with and was able to determine that she had an active warrant for arrest out of Moore County for stalking. The officer initiated a traffic stop and confirmed the driver's identity. The driver was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.
- **October 2nd – Simple assault.** A call was made to 911 requesting an officer at the parking lot of Food Lion. A teenage boy was distraught and said his father had pushed him and tried to choke him. The officer checked the teenager and so no signs of injury. He also asked he wanted to be checked out by EMS and he didn't want that. An officer went to Vayland Court to speak to the father and step-mother. They said their teenage age had been disrespectful to his step-mother and the father told him to stop and pushed him down but he denied choking him. It was agreed that the teenager would leave for the night and go home with his mother. The teenager was advised that if he wanted to press charges that he would have to go see the Magistrate. The teenager wasn't sure if he would do that.
- **October 4th – Cyber fraud.** A resident of Goldenrod Drive reported that she had been a victim of a ransom scam. She started receiving emails about charges being made to several of her credit card accounts and withdrawals from bank

- accounts. Then she received a ransom style email. The suspect(s) have all of her family's personal information and her personally owned business information. She believes they were able to get all of her passwords for all her accounts through an app used to store passwords.
- **October 5th – Possession of marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer detected the odor of marijuana coming from inside the vehicle. The officer searched the vehicle and found a grinder that contained marijuana residue. The officer photographed the item and seized it for placement into evidence. The driver was given a citation for possession of marijuana paraphernalia and an expired registration.
 - **October 7th – Warrant service.** As a result of a traffic stop for speeding the officer determined that a passenger in the vehicle had a warrant for arrest for violating a domestic violence order and for breaking and entering a motor vehicle. The officer issued the driver a citation for speeding and for having an open container of alcohol in the passenger area of the vehicle. The passenger was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.
 - **October 8th – Order for arrest for failure to appear on a fictitious info to officer charge.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined that the driver had an active order for arrest out of Moore County for failure to appear in court on a providing fictitious info to an officer. The officer placed the driver under arrest and transported him to the Moore County Jail.
 - **October 9th – Driving while license revoked.** An officer observed a vehicle that he had stopped several times before and noticed that the registration was still expired and there was an inspection violation. The officer conducted a traffic stop. The driver's license was still suspended as well. The driver has numerous prior charges (6 from Whispering Pines alone) and she has never appeared in court on any charges she has received. So, the officer placed the driver under arrest for driving while license revoked and transported her to the Moore County Jail.
 - **October 9th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Lakewood Court reported that her neighbor's dogs keep coming onto her property and defecating. The resident said the dogs bark continuously also. In addition, the cats come onto her property as well. An officer spoke to the owner of the animals who indicated that all of the allegations are false. The owner of the animals told the officer that this neighbor is always making false claims about them to Village Hall and this was confirmed by Linda Christopher.
 - **October 10th – Possession of marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer detected the odor of marijuana coming from inside the vehicle. The officer searched the vehicle and found a grinder with marijuana residue inside. The item was photographed and seized for placement into evidence. The driver was issued citations for possession of marijuana paraphernalia, displaying

- an expired and fictitious registration plate, driving while license revoked, failing to register the motor vehicle, and having no insurance on the vehicle.
- **October 11th – Larceny.** The manager of the Whispering Woods Golf Club reported that a trespassing sign was stolen off the golf course. The manager said they have had issues with people coming on to the golf course to fish in the ponds. So, they decided to put up trespassing signs to try and reduce the problem.
 - **October 11th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** An officer observed a woman stop her vehicle in the roadway to avoid hitting a dog in the roadway. The officer picked up the dog and was beginning to put the dog into his vehicle when a Cardinal Drive resident came out and said the dog belonged to her. The officer explained the Village ordinance to the dog owner and advised that her dog almost got hit by a vehicle. The dog owner blamed speeders for her dog almost getting hit. The officer issued the dog owner a warning ticket since this was the first violation.
 - **October 12th – Order for arrest for failure to appear on a possession of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia charges.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined that the driver of the vehicle had active orders for arrest out of Montgomery County for failure to appear in court on a possession of marijuana charge and possession of marijuana paraphernalia charges. The officer issued the driver a citation for driving while license revoked. The driver was then placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.
 - **October 15th – Fraud.** A bank notified our department of a customer who lives in Whispering Pines who was the victim of a fraud. The resident said that someone claiming to be from Microsoft called him and told him his Microsoft account was expiring so the resident gave the caller his bank information to renew it. The suspect then transferred \$10,399 from his savings account into his checking account. The suspect then wanted the resident to purchase money cards to them for the service. The resident didn't buy the gift cards as he now realized this was a scam.
 - **October 17th – Identity theft.** A report was received from the daughter of a Pine Crest Drive resident that someone had attempted to open a banking account from one bank and an account had been opened at another bank under her father's name. Her father had been in rehab during the time the accounts were opened. The daughter needed to file a police report on behalf of her father in order to get the credit bureau to make a correction to her father's credit history.
 - **October 17th – Violation of Village ordinance (barking dog).** A resident of Highland Drive reported that a neighbor's dog had been barking a lot. The dogs are left in the yard all the time. The officer could hear the dogs barking as well. The officer went to the dog owner's residence and issued a warning ticket since this was the first reported violation.

- **October 18th – Simple assault.** Officers were called to a “man beating woman” call on South Lakeshore Drive. When officers arrived, there was a male standing in the roadway and the two individuals involved and left the area in a vehicle. The man indicated that he and his brother drove to an apartment on South Lakeshore to pick up his brother’s girlfriend. The girlfriend was upset because they were late and started arguing with her boyfriend. The girlfriend was driving the vehicle and hitting her boyfriend who was in the backseat. The male took the keys out of the car because he was scared and wanted out of the car. The female assaulted him while trying to get the car keys back. He got out and the other two drove off. The officer advised the male that he could have a warrant taken out by going to the Magistrate but he didn’t want to do that.
- **October 20th – Driving while impaired.** An officer observed a vehicle approaching his police vehicle at an extremely high rate of speed. The vehicle was traveling 68 mph in a 45 mph zone. The driver then slammed on the brakes once the driver realized she was behind a police vehicle. The officer pulled the vehicle over. Upon approaching the vehicle, the officer could smell an odor of alcohol coming from inside the vehicle and the driver’s had glassy eyes. The officer had the driver perform several roadside field sobriety tests. The driver didn’t perform well on some of the tests. The officer placed the driver under arrest for driving while impaired and transported her to the Moore County Jail. The driver had a blood alcohol content of .09.
- **October 21st – Larceny.** A resident of Pine Ridge Drive reported that \$1,500 worth of bonds, jewelry, cash, and coins was missing from her safe that is in her closet. The door to the safe is always left open but on this day she noticed the safe was closed and she didn’t know the code to get into it. She called a locksmith. When the locksmith got the safe open, she noticed the contents of safe were gone. It was later determined that the resident is having some cognitive issues and the family will be coming to help the resident locate the missing items.
- **October 24th – Assault by strangulation.** A father of a Pine Ridge Drive resident reported that his adult daughter was in the hospital due to numerous assaults by her boyfriend. An officer went to the hospital to gather more information. The officer advised her to go to the Magistrate’s Office to have papers taken out on her boyfriend. The Magistrate issued a warrant for the boyfriend’s arrest for the charges. However, the boyfriend is in the hospital for treatment and is expected to be there for four weeks. Officers will attempt to serve the warrant upon his release from the hospital.

2. There were four (4) traffic accidents in the Village this month.

- **October 7th** – A vehicle making a left turn onto Hardee Lane struck the stop sign that was inside the median on Hardee Lane. The driver left the scene without stopping.
- **October 16th** – An accident occurred at the intersection of Airport Road and Hardee Lane. A vehicle turning left onto Hardee Lane, turned in front of an oncoming vehicle that was going straight. One person was taken to the hospital to be checked out. Both vehicles had to be towed from the scene. The driver who turned in front of the oncoming vehicle was issued a citation for an unsafe movement.
- **October 26th** – An accident occurred at the intersection of Niagara Carthage Road and Airport Road. A vehicle was stopped waiting to make a left turn. A second vehicle struck the rear of the vehicle. There were no injuries but one of the vehicles needed to be towed from the scene.
- **October 31st** – An accident occurred on Niagara Carthage Road. A deer ran into the roadway and was struck by a vehicle. There were no injuries and the vehicle was towed from the scene.

3. Safety (Department)

- All officers attended annual state mandated in service firearms training in addition to completing their firearms qualification and TASER recertification training this month.
- All officers completed Hazmat and Bloodborne Pathogens training this month as part of their state mandated in service training.

4. Safety (Village)

- Advised Village Hall of a street light at Hardee Lane and Bogie Drive that was not working.
- An officer was stationed at the Meet the Candidates Forum on October 3rd and the League of Women Voters Candidate Forum on October 17th.
- Four officers worked conducting patrols on Halloween while children were out trick or treating.
- Chief Campbell, Bob Kissinger, and the Village Manager met with DOT in reference to traffic issues around the Village.

5. Other Events of Interest

- **October 9th** – Lt. Dozier attended the monthly Investigators Meeting that was held at the Vass Police Department. Local law enforcement agencies discuss issues of common concern during these meetings.
- **October 10th** – Chief Campbell, Master Officer Holt, and Lisa Weaver attended the Village's Volunteer Appreciation Reception that was held at Thagard Park.

- **October 29th** – Lt. Dozier attended the multi-disciplinary human trafficking task force meeting that was held at the Moore County Sheriff’s Office.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Goal #1: To provide a uniform standard that will enable personnel of the department to be more consistent in procedures when handling situations.

Daily briefings are being conducted by officers at shift changes. The Sergeant and Master Officer have also discussed monthly schedule and operational concerns with all officers this month.

There were no revised policies this month.

All officers completed policy reviews of General Order 031 – Tint Meter Usage and General Order 032 – Secondary-Off Duty Employment.

Goal #2: To provide for education and further development of department personnel to enhance officer and department professionalism.

Officer Cirillo completed the week long radar certification course at Sandhills Community College on October 4th.

Officer Cirillo completed the 4-day DWI and Standardized Field Sobriety Training course at Wake Tech Community College on October 11th.

All sworn personnel completed their state mandated in service firearms training and firearms qualification on October 16th.

Officer Cirillo completed the state mandated in service training Leadership and Professional Development on October 19th.

All sworn personnel successfully completed the state mandated in service firearms training and qualification on October 16, 2019. All officers also completed TASER instruction on this date as well.

Sgt. Graham completed the state mandated in service training Best Practices for Officers During Community dissent.

All sworn personnel successfully completed the state mandated in service HazMat training and Bloodborne Pathogens training on October 28th.

Goal #3: Provide for a higher degree of personal contact between community and department personnel.

Officers welcomed 13 new residents this month and provided the new residents with a police “Welcome Packet” describing many of the services offered by our department.

Goal #4: Conduct special enforcement programs and participate in GHSP campaigns.

There were no checkpoints conducted this month.

Goal #5: Continue current crime prevention programs to maintain the Village's low crime statistics.

We continue to be fully staffed.

A traffic complaint was received in September about speeding in the area of Lavender Drive. Officers conducted a total of 10 speed surveys and did issue 2 warning tickets for speeding. The speed trailer was also set up on Lavender Drive as a reminder to the motoring public to watch their speed when traveling through the area. The speed trailer showed that the average speed was 27 mph on Lavender Drive.

A traffic complaint was received in September about speeding on Lakeview Drive. Officers completed a total of 15 speed surveys on this road. Also, the radar trailer was utilized to make the public aware of their speeds when traveling through this area. The radar trailer showed that the average speed was 26 mph.

Officers have conducted:

- House checks – 327 (average 11 a day)
- Business checks – 925
- Store closings – 49
- Food Lion foot patrols - 61

We added 2 new seniors to our Senior Call In Program this month. So, we now have 11 seniors in the program.

We provided the new The Pitch with stats from October.

We have 5 certified child seat technicians. 4 officers and the Sergeant are certified child seat technicians.

Goal #6: Proactive approach in looking for safety concerns.

In our efforts to meet OSHA requirements, quarterly and yearly reviews of the Infectious Disease Control Plan have been scheduled. The next quarterly review will be scheduled for December 2019.
