



From the Desk of Chief Domonic Campbell August Monthly Report for Police Department

Date: October 2, 2018

Special Notes

We collected 8.6 pounds of pills this month.

Moore County Animal Services gave our department a microchip scanner, at no cost to the Village. This will allow our officers to scan dogs to see if they are chipped and if so allow to identify the owner of the dog.

New officer, Jessica Howard, is nearing the end of her field training program.

During the recent hurricane the department responded to numerous incidents. Several officers during the duration of the event rotated shifts and some slept on cots in the conference room to provide enough manpower as needed.

The phone calls from Village Hall were transferred to the police department where Estelle Makie, Lisa Weaver, and Linda Christopher assisted with taking a high volume of calls. 37% of calls were about household trash pickup.

Events of interest for the month of September 2018

1. **There were twenty-one (21) incidents that were investigated this month. Of these incidents thirteen (13) involved an arrest with 21 total charges.**

After an arrest, officers are unavailable for at least 2 hours while processing and booking subjects at the Moore County Jail in Carthage. Serving a criminal summons does not require detaining or taking the subject to jail.

- **September 1st – Found property.** A resident found a set of keys on the side of Ainsley Drive. The resident picked them up and contacted the police department. The keys were placed into evidence in hopes of finding the owner of the keys. Keys were returned to owner.
- **September 5th – Endangered person.** The department received a call from a person in Arizona stating that she was concerned about a friend who lived in Whispering Pines but didn't know his exact address. Her friend had sent a text that made her concerned about him harming himself. An officer contacted the endangered person's cell phone company to see if they could ping his phone to determine his location. The cell phone company gave a location range that was very close to Whispering Pines village limits. Another officer contacted the military to see if they could find an address for this person. The military had an address in Southern Pines and another officer found some information on social media that made reference to another location just outside Whispering Pines (but in the Village's ETJ). While an officer was in contact with Moore County Dispatch a BOLO was issued by Southern Pines Police looking for this person. Our officers and a Moore County Sheriff Office deputy met up and began a search for this endangered person. An officer received a call from another friend of this endangered person who stated he had just spoken with him and he would meet the officers. The officers went to the location and the endangered person came walking out of the woods. Due to the location, the Sheriff's Office dealt with the endangered person after he was located.
- **September 6th – Breaking and entering and larceny.** A resident of Goldenrod Drive reported that someone had entered their residence and took two rings from the master bedroom and two external hard drives from the office. There were no signs of forced entry. The residents believe someone may have entered their home while they were in their backyard. The residents stated that the only people in the house recently were family members who there over the weekend but they do not believe they would take anything.
- **September 6th – Active warrant for assault with a deadly weapon and simple assault.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined that the driver

- of the vehicle had an active warrant for her arrest out of Moore County for assault with a deadly weapon and simple assault. The driver had her children in the vehicle so the officer had her contact her husband to come pick up the children. After the children were picked up, the officer placed the driver under arrest and transported her to the Moore County Jail.
- **September 8th – Possession of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer detected a strong odor of cologne coming from the vehicle. When the officer approached the vehicle the second time the officer could smell a strong odor of marijuana. The officer searched the vehicle and found marijuana in the center console. The officer also found two glass pipes and a glass jar containing marijuana residue. These items were photographed and seized for placement into evidence. The officer issued citations to the driver for possession of marijuana, possession of marijuana paraphernalia, no insurance, revoked license plate, no inspection, and operating a vehicle with rear lights emitting white light. The driver was arrested by citation for the possession charges.
 - **September 9th – Breaking and entering, and larceny after breaking and entering.** An employee of the Whispering Pines Country Club reported that they believe someone broke into the pro shop. When the manager arrived in the morning he found the alarm shut off and golf carts outside of the golf cart shed. The manager then noticed some tools missing from the golf cart shed and was told by an employee that some golf clothing and a golf club were missing along with some cash from the register. Officers dusted areas of the pro shop for fingerprints. A person found some of the golf clothing and a golf club near the pool area and brought it to the pro shop. The manager stated that the night before there was an event at the club that lasted until 1:00 am.
 - **September 10th – Served criminal summons for simple assault.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer determined that the driver had an outstanding criminal summons for simple assault. The officer contacted the magistrate to obtain a new court date and then served the driver with the criminal summons. The officer also issued the driver a citation for driving with no license.
 - **September 11th – Active order for arrest for failure to appear in court.** An officer observed a vehicle at a residence that he knew belonged to someone who had an active order for arrest for failure to appear on a speeding charge. The officer went to the residence and determined that the person was there. The male was placed under arrest and transported to the Moore County Jail.
 - **September 12th – Second degree trespass.** Fire Department reported that a former volunteer fire fighter was on the premises of the Fire Department. The fire fighter had been terminated from the department and banned from the premises in May 2018. The former fire fighter came to the fire department and went inside to obtain ice for a cooler. When told by an employee that he wasn't

suppose to be there he said nothing and continued to fill his cooler. After filling the cooler, he left. The officer obtained a criminal summons from the Magistrate for the violation. They went to the fire fighter's residence to serve the summons but he was not at the residence.

- **September 13th – Found property.** A public works employee found a set of keys on the side of Niagara Carthage Road and turned them in to the police department. An officer was able to find a name of a person due to a store tag on the keychain. The officer contacted the owner of the keys and the keys were returned to the owner.
- **September 13th – Possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop an officer detected a very strong odor of marijuana when she approached the vehicle. The officer searched the vehicle and found a small bag of marijuana, a wrapper with marijuana inside, a grinder, and more marijuana found in the sunglasses visor. All of these items were photographed and seized for placement into evidence. The officer issued citations for possession of marijuana, possession of drug paraphernalia, driving with a revoked license plate, and no insurance. The driver was arrested by citation for the marijuana violations.
- **September 19th – Possession of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer detected the odor of marijuana when the officer approached the vehicle. The officer conducted a search of the vehicle and found a bag of marijuana, a grinder, and a scale. The items were photographed and seized for placement into evidence. The officer arrested the driver by citation and issued citations for possession of marijuana, possession of marijuana paraphernalia, improper passing, and no operators license.
- **September 21st – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Horizon Court reported that a neighbor's dogs were running loose in her yard and while trying to restrain her own dog her finger was broken. The dog owner was issued a warning ticket for the violation as this was the first offense.
- **September 22nd – Found property.** While conducting a food patrol at Food Lion an officer found a credit card on the pavement outside the store. The officer took the credit card for placement into evidence for safekeeping. The officer made contact with a manager from a dealership in Raleigh who indicated that one of their gas cards had gone missing. Someone from the dealership will arrange to pick up the credit card.
- **September 22nd – Possession of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia.** Officers received a call from the New Day Way homeowner. She advised there was a domestic dispute in progress at her home between her adult daughter and her boyfriend. When officers arrived, they determined that the boyfriend wanted to leave with their baby but the homeowner's daughter told him she would have an Amber Alert issued if he left with the baby. The boyfriend said he didn't

want to leave without the baby because he girlfriend almost drowned the baby a few days ago. Since there was no custody order in place both parties were advised that the father of the baby could leave with the baby. Then the adult daughter told the officers that there was marijuana in the baby bag. The boyfriend handed the officer the baby bag and the officer found a plastic container containing marijuana, a grinder, and rolling papers inside. The items were photographed and then seized for placement into evidence. Neither party would admit who the marijuana and paraphernalia belonged to so the officer charged both parties with possession. Both parties were arrested by citation for possession of marijuana and possession of marijuana paraphernalia. There was no evidence of any physical injury to either party. Officers stayed until the boyfriend left the residence with the baby.

- **September 25th – Assault on a female.** An officer was dispatched to a residence on Canal Lane in reference to a domestic assault that had just occurred. When the officer arrived, a female came from a neighbor's house limping. She stated her husband shoved her and kicked her. He had left the residence by the time the officer arrived. The officer obtained a statement and also obtained photos of the injury on her leg. The officer obtained a warrant from the Magistrate's Office. The husband turned himself in at the police department and the officer placed him under arrest and transported him to the Moore County Jail.
- **September 25th – Possession of marijuana and marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer detected a strong odor of marijuana when he approached the vehicle. The driver initially told the officer that he didn't have any marijuana in his vehicle. The officer again told the driver that he could clearly smell it. The driver then handed the officer a cigarillo pack from inside his pants that contained marijuana. The officer then searched the vehicle and found a scale. The officer arrested the driver by citation for possession of marijuana and possession of marijuana paraphernalia.
- **September 28th – Simple assault.** Officers were dispatched to a Goldenrod Drive residence because there were two brothers fighting at the residence. When the officers arrived, the older brother was outside and upset with his younger brother who was inside. The younger brother has a development disorder. Both brothers had some marks or scratches. No one wanted to press any charges for the fight. The younger brother was very upset that the police were called and threatened to harm himself. Officers were able to contact the Mobile Crisis Unit and a person from this unit was able to talk to the younger brother and agree to go to the hospital voluntarily. The officer followed the family as they took him to the hospital to ensure everyone would be safe.
- **September 29th – Violation of Village ordinance (dog at large).** A resident of Lakeview Drive reported that two loose dogs were in her yard. An officer went

to the residence and picked up the dogs. The dogs were placed in the kennel at the police department. The officer also scanned the dogs for a chip but neither dog had a chip. Animal Control was contacted and they came to pick up the dogs.

- **September 29th – Possession of marijuana paraphernalia.** As a result of a traffic stop the officer detected the odor of marijuana coming from inside the vehicle. The driver indicated that there was nothing in the vehicle. After the officer asked again the driver admitted to having a couple of items in the vehicle. The officer found a pipe and a grinder. The officer photographed the items and seized the items for placement into evidence. The driver was given a citation for possession of marijuana paraphernalia and a warning ticket for following too close.
- **September 30th – Assault on a female.** An officer was aware of an outstanding order for arrest for a resident of Ray’s Bridge Road. The officer went to the residence and advised the resident of the outstanding order for arrest for failing to appear on an assault on a female charge. The officer placed the resident under arrest and transported him to the Moore County Jail.

2. There were two (2) traffic accidents in the Village this month.

- **September 12th** – An accident occurred on Hardee Lane. A vehicle stopped at the stop sign and then moved forward to see better. A second vehicle that was behind moved forward and collided with the rear of the vehicle at the stop sign. There were no injuries reported and both vehicles were able to be driven from the scene. The driver of the second vehicle was issued a citation for unsafe movement.
- **September 24th** – An accident occurred at the intersection of Hardee Lane and Country Club Blvd. The vehicle traveling on Country Club Blvd failed to stop at the stop sign and struck a vehicle traveling on Hardee Lane. No injuries were reported. Both vehicles had to be towed from the scene.

3. Safety (Department)

- We continue to provide training for police staff.

4. Safety (Village)

- Provided services to the residents before, during and after the storm.

5. Other Events of Interest

- **September 2nd** – Our department participated in the Taylortown Labor Day parade with a marked police vehicle.

- **September 4th** – Senior Officer Holt attended the monthly SafeKids Meeting that was held in Pinehurst. Our department also earned 25 points in the NC Governor’s Highway Safety Step Reporting Program for attending this meeting.
- **September 5th** – Lt. Dozier and Sgt. Graham attended a planning meeting for an upcoming active shooter training event that will take place in October.
- **September 9th – 12th** – Chief Campbell attended the FBI’s 2018 Command College that was held in Blowing Rock, NC. Some of the topics covered were media relations, neighborhood gangs & civil unrest, current trends in the IED world, and leadership legacy.
- **September 12th** – Lt. Dozier attended the monthly Investigators Meeting that was held at the Pinehurst Police Department. Issues of common concern among local law enforcement agencies are discussed at these meetings.

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Goal #1: To provide a uniform standard that will enable personnel of the department to be more consistent in procedures when handling situations.

Daily briefings are being conducted by officers at shift changes. The Lieutenant and Sergeant have also discussed monthly schedule and operational concerns with all officers this month.

General order 016 – Uniforms and Appearance was revised this month. The changes made include changes to the Lieutenant's uniform, added a section on the wearing of outer vest carriers, and added a sentence regarding failure to keep common areas and vehicle clean could lead to disciplinary action.

All officers completed policy reviews of General Order 005 – Arrest Procedures and General Order 006 – Custody Procedures for Suspects Wanted by Outside Agencies.

Goal #2: To provide for education and further development of department personnel to enhance officer and department professionalism.

All officers viewed a training video put out by the Office of Justice Programs' Bureau of Justice Assistance on the Fentanyl Safety Recommendations for First Responders. This training will help officers protect themselves when the presence of fentanyl is suspected or encountered.

Lt. Dozier successfully completed his DCI recertification test for General Inquiries and is now recertified for another 2 years.

Lt. Dozier successfully completed Criminal Intelligence Systems Operating Policies Online Training on September 18th. This training was required before he attends upcoming FLOW training next month.

Officer Strickland successfully completed the mandated in service training 2018 Legal Updates on September 17th.

Lt. Dozier successfully completed the mandated in service training 2018 Officer Safety: Surviving Planned Attacks Against Law Enforcement Officers on September 28th.

All personnel completed the Disaster Preparedness on line course as requested by the Village Manager.

Goal #3: Provide for a higher degree of personal contact between community and department personnel.

There were no community events held this month.

Officers welcomed 14 new residents this month and provided the new residents with a police "Welcome Packet" describing many of the services offered by our department.

There were no checkpoints conducted this month.

Goal #5: Continue current crime prevention programs to maintain the Village's low crime statistics.

We remain fully staffed.

We added another senior to our Senior Call In Program this month so we now have a total of 10 seniors in the Senior Call In Program.

There were no requests for articles this month.

No traffic studies were conducted this month.

We have 5 certified child seat technicians. 4 officers and the Sergeant are certified child seat technicians.

Goal #6: Proactive approach in looking for safety concerns.

In our efforts to meet OSHA requirements, quarterly and yearly reviews of the Infectious Disease Control Plan have been scheduled. Chief Campbell completed a quarterly review this month and found no changes that were necessary at this time. Next quarterly review will be scheduled for December.
